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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Coach Mark Harrity and his Men's 1st Grade team are once again to be congratulated on another premiership, this time it's a T20 title that they have added to our burgeoning trophy cabinet. That's SIX across the three different formats over the past seven & a half seasons, with hopefully more to be added later in the season as we've progressed to the 50 over Grand Final, and after one full round of the Two-Day games sit in 3rd Spot.

Regarding the T20 success, it was built on an amazing foundation from a 120-run opening stand (off just 64 balls) from Bailey Capel & Kelv Smith, followed by a quick fire 54 off 33 from Daniel Drew, while Harry Manenti remained 14 n.o. - a huge 197 off our allotted 20 overs. Then we really got on top, Spencer striking with the first ball, even before many of the 1000 plus crowd had found their seats, Glenelg slumped to 2/. Then Jordan Buckingham, Harry Manenti, Pat Brown, and Jimmy Ruether joined the party before Dan Fallins cleaned up the tail. Glenelg was bundled out for just 67. An astonishing, crushing victory by 130 runs, against a team which fielded some very handy talent from across Australia including Nathan McSweeney, Harry Conway, Liam Scott and Brendan Doggett. A great win & an even better celebration, with most of our U.14 and many of our other junior players joining the senior team in the AO changerooms after the game, just the beginning of the night for many of our experienced title winners though!

Continuing on with the positive on field news, it's very pleasing to see both our U.14 teams right in the mix for finals and a good chance of progressing to the last game of the season, while our U.16s have started to produce some excellent victories in recent rounds, none any better than the U.16 Reds thrilling run chase to overcome Woodville at our main (Henley) Oval, thanks to a wonderful last wicket partnership from Levi Barratt & Angus Petherick.

Our women's program continues to gain momentum with some excellent team & individual performances,. It's been great to see lots of the players performing at both District & higher (rep) levels, Makenzie Holy even making the Team of the tournament in the recent U.16 Australian National Championships. Without exception all our women's teams sit almost exactly mid table, with a good chance many will squeeze into finals where they would hope to inflict some damage.

Our Academy program continues to thrive, games throughout the school holidays further enforcing that along with some excellent top end talent. We have extremely good depth coming through ready to join our junior squads in the next 2-3 years. Pleasingly we've also seen one of our Female Academy playes progress to play her first Senior game in out ATCA T20 3rd Grade team, congratulations Jasmine! It's been great to see first graders, Jasper Davidson, Olly Ellicott and Hannah Knowles out at most sessions with Luke Terry, Lana Ryan. Daniel Drew, Sean Hunt, Seb Young and Pat Brown joining our coaching team in recent sessions. A quick thank you to Sam Turner, who unfortunately through a new job opportunity is unable to finish the season but we have been most impressed with his efforts with these players.

Off field, we've received a small grant to help promote and grow cricket & the club from the CA Grass Roots fund. We've used that to help produce a large banner/sign that sits behind our turf training nets. Be sure to check that out next time you are at Henley or via our social media which have also received a boost from the grant which has enabled us to enlist LM Media, run by Harry Manenti's brother out of Sydney, to help produce content for our various platforms. Another grant in the works is that of applying for a further ACIF (SACA/Cricket Australia) grant to help provide some monetary support to HFC who are once again looking to add to the Henley Oval facilities with a new electronic scoreboard in the very near future.

We've also submitted a couple of Grant applications to help with the John Mitchell pitch upgrade. Be sure to keep an eye out on how you can help with the City of Charles Sturt funding in the coming months. While on the CCS, we recently received some great news with our very own Denis Brien winning the City of Charles Sturt (Senior) Citizen of the Year award, another in a long line of outstanding achievements & recognitions of one of our most decorated Eagles.

Finally, the fantastic finish to the BBL season from Spencer Johnson must be mentioned, Spencer took home the BBL Player of the Grand Final Medal, taking 4/26 in the final to help his Brisbane Heat to the title. He was ably supported in the field by 12th man, another Eagle quick, Jordan Buckingham who took two catches in the decider (another record, most catches by a sub fielder in a BBL GF). Bucks dedication to his cricket & the Eagles, cannot be questioned as he has spent a lot of his time & money flying between states to play for us whenever a gap in his BBL commitments has allowed. These young men are special players & people, and we are extremely lucky to have them as part of our playing group.

Kelvin Smith's double century v. East Torrens took him to third place in the all-time 1st Grade run aggregate (2-Day competition only) passing Test batsman **Ron Hamence** 5808 and games record holder **Brian Isaac** 5731. As at 14 January Kelvin had amassed 5974. This only the fifth double century scored at Henley Oval the others were by **Daniel Drew, Kelvin (previous one), Ryan Gibson** and **Lauren Ebsary**.

Daniel Drew has become the 18th player to become part of the elite 4500 + run group (2-Day competition) and is on 4648 at 14 January.

Kelvin Smith (200 n.o.) and **Harry Manenti (131 n.o.)** created a record for the 3rd wicket partnership in the match v. East Torrens surpassing the previous best of 240 by **Ryan Gibson** (205) and **Eric Carrington** (63 n.o.) v. Sturt at Henley Oval, October 2020.

Jemma Barsby played her 100th WNCL match when the Scorpions played Victoria at Karen Rolton Oval on 31 January. She has also played 125 WBBL games. An extraordinary feat from a quality person. Congratulations JB!

Makenzie Holy, Chelsea Shepperd and **Aijay Willoughby** were all part of the Under 16 South Australian Girls team which played in the National Championship. All had very good tournaments with **Makenzie** being named in the Team of the Tournament.

Under 18 keeper **Jack Terry** had a phenomenal day behind the stumps at Woodville Oval on January 9. He took part in 7 dismissals in the Woodville innings – 4 catches, 1 stumping and two

run-outs (including one solo) on January 9.. Other keepers with similar records in the past have been:

Kelvin Smith, Bailey Capel and Spencer Johnson, Daniel Drew plus **Mark Harrity** as Coach have now participated in two 2-Day, two 1-Day and two T20 Premiership for the Club – 2016-17 and 2021-22.

Under 16 Reds' players **Levi Barratt (71 n.o.)** and **Angus Petherick (35)** created a new 10th wicket partnership record for any of our Junior Grades when they put on 107 v. Woodville at Henley Oval on February 3. The previous best was 28 years ago when **Peter Screnci (66 n.o.)** and **Matthew Loveder (12)** had a partnership of 80 for the U16 Reds v. Glenelg at Jack Fox Oval on 4 February 1996. This is the only time that a century partnership for the 10th wicket has been recorded by a West Torrens junior pair.

Spencer Johnson steered Brisbane Heat to victory in the BBL Final against the Sydney Sixers at the SCG when he took 4/26 from his quota of 4 overs. **Jordan Buckingham** was 12th man for the Heat on the night and took two catches fielding as a sub. Spence was dubbed Player of the Final.

Former 1st Grader and brother of Spencer, **Isaac Johnson**, has been named as captain of West Adelaide for the 2024 SANFL season. *Check your lockers for booby-traps lads!*

MEN'S FIRST GRADE

Round 4: We played Kensington away , they won the toss and made 204. Jimmy Reuther was outstanding with the ball taking 5 wickets. We batted and we fell short of the target with 7/197 with Kelvin making 67, Drewy 41 and Reggie Els 31 not out.

Round 5: We played Port away in round 5, we won the toss and bowled , they made 6/234 off 78 overs, Sean Hunt and Jimmy Reuther took 2 wickets each. We then batted and made 6/118 with Kelvin 53 not out. The game was a draw.

Despite a strong start we suffered a collapse in the middle-order as wickets fell in rapid succession. An 8th Wicket partnership of 50+ between Charlie Henderson-Whitehead and Hannah Knowles meant we finished on 8-202. A strong bowling performance all round restricted Glenelg to 141 all out (Clark 2-21 off 7.2, Knowles 2-22 off 8, Barsby 3-32 off 8 and Wellington 2-20 off 8).

Round 9 was a difficult one as a young team took on Sturt at home. Sturt won the toss and opted to bat, with their experienced batters running well between the wickets and punishing loose balls set 225-8. Sharma and Aijay Willoughby were the pick of the bowlers with 2-29 off 10 and 2-37 off 8 respectively. We did not give our best batting display and finished 105 a.o.- a tough loss.

Friday 19th January was the 20th anniversary of the unfortunate and untimely death of West Torrens legend **David Hookes**. David is arguably the most talented player produced at West Torrens and played more Tests (23) and first class matches (178) than any other locally reared son. Jeff Crowe with 39 tests played more, but he is a son of Auckland and played for his native country New Zealand. The statistics above are enough indication of David's cricket talent. He was a freak left-hander who could smash an attack into oblivion, take the new ball or bowl his left arm orthodox spinners or chinamen. He was the closest that West Torrens has ever had to a Sobers. So while we who played with him celebrate being part of his life, it is relevant to take a look inside of the lesser known parts of his life.

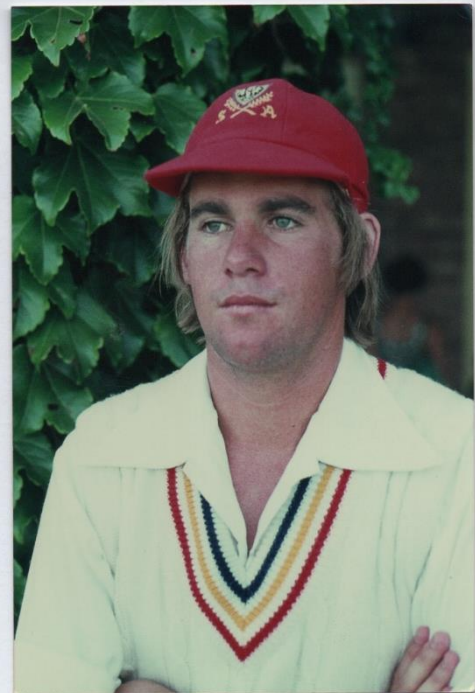
The YOUTH

Early Life

When David was born, the arches of his feet were not completely horizontal tilting upwards from inside to out and at the age of three it was discovered that one leg was slightly shorter than the other. These problems in turn caused his legs to be severely bowed. An orthopaedic specialist gave his parents a choice of him wearing leg irons or going shoeless, as a remedial treatment. They chose the latter. He didn't begin to wear shoes until the age of five and then only to Thebarton Primary School. There was a fair bit of teasing by other kids about lack of footwear, but he just used to play all sports barefooted and it didn't seem to worry him - only his family.

David had a half-brother from his Mum Pat's first marriage, Terry Cranage, who was twelve years his senior. Terry was a leading South Australian junior tennis player having contested every state junior final from Under 12 to Under 17 before eventually beating Peter Harris for the latter. In 1960 he was selected captain of the state team to contest the Linton Cup (Under 19) against all other states. As the number one player he was forced to contend with John Newcombe and Owen Davidson and at the age of 16 lost the SA Under 19 title to Newcombe, two sets to one. Terry was ranked number ten Australian junior in 1961. Clearly the Osborne gene pool was weighted heavily with the characteristics of ball skills and hand and eye coordination.

Consequently, David's first love was tennis and even as a pre-schooler played paddle tennis with Terry in the driveway of their home using a sprinkler system as a net. David may have developed into a Wimbledon contender rather than a Test cricketer had Terry not left for Melbourne in 1961 to be coached by Harry Hopman. As he was unable to afford overseas tennis experience, Terry soon joined the Australian diplomatic corps and never returned to Adelaide to settle permanently.

From the Clifford St. home of the Hookes family, there was a 50-metre sprint to the corner and then the long 500 metre haul up the Meyer St. straight, to Thebarton Oval. To the Torrensville Tyros it was a four minute stroll but the barefoot Hookes would do it in two. 'Thebby' Oval was the headquarters of the *Eagles*, the West Torrens Cricket and Football Clubs, the mecca of sport in Torrensville folklore. To the local lads it was the Land of the Giants - the home of legendary football Magarey Medallists Bob Hank and Lindsay Head who had also participated in A grade cricket premierships. It was also the sporting birthplace of Phil Ridings, state cricket captain and

Australian selector, of Ron Hamence, a member of Bradman's 1948 Invincibles and scorer of a century in his first and last state games and also of Bruce Dooland, the leg spinning magician who took 1016 wickets for Australia, South Australia and Nottinghamshire.

With his idol and big brother off the scene, Hookesy looked for a new outlet for his enthusiasm. This was to be Thebarton Oval. So at the age of eleven Hookesy, by now a bat and ball fanatic, became the bare foot retriever of cricket leather hit into the long field by audacious or frustrated net batsmen, on Tuesday and Thursday practice nights. He was always extremely respectful calling "I'll chase it for you Mister" rather than using their nick names like Banga or Rocka or Zac. At that time it was quite common for clubs not to appoint a coach and it was up to the captains to manage practice sessions.

One night the A grade captain Brian 'Banga' Flaherty asked David whether he would like to have a hit at the end of the night. Overwhelmed he immediately raced home, told his parents that Mr. Flaherty said that he could have a hit on the turf pitches and was back in a flash with his own equipment. At the end of training he went into the A grade net. 'Banga' and a few others bowled to him off a couple of paces as he was just a young kid on whom they took pity. After four or five balls the feisty fair haired midget walked down the pitch and exclaimed to the experienced A graders "Are you guys gonna bowl properly or what? Because I don't want you bowling that slow crap at me!" So they became a little more fair dinkum and David showed his talent with straight and cover drives, cuts and pulls and leg glances. He had it all then, even the turn of phrase. Although he wrote with his right hand, David always hit and threw with his left.

As a young lad he was infatuated with sport in general, ran everywhere and was barefooted most of the time. I dubbed him 'Shoeless Joe Jackson' after the famous American pro baseballer. He was to become even more famous than 'Shoeless Joe'. While Jackson was one of the eight Chicago White Sox players who were involved in match fixing during the 1919 baseball World Series, 'Hookesy' in contrast fixed up many matches with his bat.

David was first selected in the Under 17 SACA District Schoolboys competition in January 1969. Experience indicated that it was good for the boys to play two years in this competition, three years if they were exceptional, but four years - no! He looked so talented despite his age and stature that he immediately had to play some games for experience; a four-year person. Unfortunately on the morning of the first match, his eyes welled up with tears when told he wasn't playing - he was confident he would be required for every game - a confidence which never left him and served him well.

A gratifying experience was to watch him play against Western Australia in the last match of the 1974 Under 19 Championship in Melbourne. Western Australia and South Australia were undefeated, the winner would take home the Kookaburra Shield. A spin attack of David, bowling 'chinamen' and John Frick (another future state player) trundling LA finger spin, kept Western Australia to a moderate score. South Australia started badly against Terry Alderman who quickly had two wickets but a brash Hookes strode to the wicket and within a few overs blasted Alderman out of the attack.

His humour

He had an infectious sense of humour, not Black Comedy but certainly off-white. There was a distinct flavour of Milligan brilliance, blended with a touch of comedic anarchy and bound together in an earthy Aussie banter. Hookesy was fortunate to inherit valuable characteristics through both his maternal and paternal genealogy. His athleticism was through his mother Pat. However those genes which his father Russell propagated began to show in his late teens. He was always full of fun, but now a keen sense of humour was emerging, as was the indelible laughter when taking the 'mickey'; a desire to question was noticeable and he began to make his own way through the conformity of the cricket world. As he grew older he developed self-analysis and self-reliance and of course those captious subtleties developed in his conversation which was delivered with machine-gun like precision. How I loved his pedantic banter and the semantics. Hookesy could

really entice you into his web, have you crash in a heap and then you would both convulse with laughter.

I recall later in life telling him how proud I was of having completed a half marathon at the age of 44. He simply replied "You couldn't have". I was quite deflated. Having expected adulation or at least a compliment, all I received was a letdown. I replied "David I did, I actually completed a half marathon". Again he retorted "Did you also enter the half high jump and the half triple jump. Have you ever run a half 800m. or a half 200m. They don't have half Premierships or half Test matches do they? You completed the 21km. race but a half marathon means that pulled out of the marathon half way around". My ego returned and we sat down and both pissed ourselves laughing.

I was fortunate to have David with me in the B Grade team when I was captain, but he was promoted after about a season. I only played one A Grade match with him, which was when I was in my early 30s and was recalled to the As as we had a big contingent in the SA side. I remember I clipped a ball to mid-wicket for a quick run. There was a run in it – about a half each. It was an ambitious call plus Hookey was 'sitting on his perch' not backing up. He should have been run out by four metres but the over ambitious lad a mid-wicket decided to perform some heroics and attempted to throw the stumps down instead of waiting for the keeper, John Donaldson. He threw wide, the ball hurtled towards third man and we jogged an easy two. I apologised profusely, but David just threw back his blonde mane and quipped "Don't worry about it Rocka – you're a genius. You just turned a half into two".

His leadership and abstract thinking

A bold and imaginative leader he captained South Australia 90 times including the 1981-82 victorious Sheffield Shield combination. However he was sensationally stripped of the captaincy for the 1990-91 season in favour of Andrew Hilditch, when he was closing on Les Favell's record of 95. One always suspected some deviousness behind the dethronement.

Hookey's cricket was always aggressive and attractive and the spectator was never sure when it would become explosive. He was confident, at times brash and didn't suffer fools gladly. He could be openly contemptuous of conservative and pompous authority but extremely supportive of his team, friends and club. He was an icon yet iconoclastic. As a captain he was incisive, attacking and positive, approaching every club game as though it was a first class match. He was a brilliant player, at times inconsistent, but always conscious of the fact that the spectator or the viewer deserved value for money. He flew with the high fliers but never forgot his working class background. You can take the boy out of the western suburbs but you can't take the western suburbs out of the boy.

David always questioned unfairness and inequality whether within or outside of the cricket world. It was he who was responsible for stopping bowlers having long warm-ups on the turf square before a spell. An incident occurred in An SA v. NSW Sheffield game at Adelaide Oval. Greg Matthews was brought onto bowl by skipper and keeper Steve Rixon. Rixon, of whom David was not a fan, moved across to a previously used 'track' on the square (on occasions he would take a stump with him and put it in place on the used pitch). Matthews bowled a 'warm-up' ball to Rixon, then a second and as he bowled the third, Hookey stepped in front of Rixon and pulled it over square-leg into the Victor Richardson gates. The umpire raced across and exclaimed "What in the (expletive) do you think you are doing?" Hookey simply replied "If he can have a 'warm-up' ball then I'm entitled to a 'warm up' hit." The umpire walked meekly back to his normal position and the game resumed.

Cricket Australia soon took action and next season banned 'warm-up' balls on the centre square. Should a player attempt one now (including Grade cricket) the player is banned from the bowling crease for 30 minutes.

His Death

Unfortunately 'Hookesy' died after being assaulted by a Security Guard when celebrating with some of his Victorian teammates and Redback mates after a Domestic One Day game at the MCG. About 10,000 people attended his funeral at the Adelaide Oval on 27 January 2004. They arrived from England, Germany, New Zealand, all Australian states and of course Torrensville. His life, talent and mateship were saluted by politicians and parkland cricketers, the elite of the sporting world and captains of industry, pensioners and school students, media and mates - anyone who appreciated what he had given to sport.

R.I.P.

A teammate and colleague of Don Bradman asked me a little later why 10,000 had turned out for David's funeral but only a few hundred for Bradman's. The answer was glaringly obvious. One was blue collar, the other Board room. One was gregarious and the other reclusive. One had the touch of the common man, the other was blanché with privilege.

David Hookes was Clubman, a teammate, someone constantly committed to win for his side, a loyal friend who would never let you down and was always accessible to the everyday person. The mischievous, barefoot kid from working class Torrensville was a mate, the consummate entertainer, a larrikin, a legend and a cricketer in excelsis.

We have been very fortunate to gain the services of Scorpions captain Jemma Barsby, this season. When Northern Districts had to pull out of First Grade before the first round she was on the hunt for a new team and liked the way West Torrens go about their club cricket and how passionate coach Froggy Murdoch is for Women's cricket.

Jemma is a talented allrounder who has impressed many during her time at the elite level. She is an ambidextrous finger spinner who is comfortable dropping a ball on a length with either arm and sometimes changes dexterity mid-over. A very useful left-handed middle order batter at State level she has also developed a penchant for switch hitting.

She was brought up in a cricketing family and attended Nundah State School and Mount Alvernia College. Her Dad is Trevor Barsby who played 111 First-Class and 54 List A matches for Queensland and also coached the Bulls post-retirement, while her brother Corey represented Queensland at both Under 23 and 19 levels. There was no family pressure to go down the cricket path but plenty of backyard games with friends and family endeared her to the game and she has never looked back. She also receives much support from her Mum Sue and sister Olivia.

Jemma grew up playing hockey in the winter and then cricket in the summer and found the former was a great way to stay fit for cricket and also help her competitive side.

She was selected in Queensland Junior teams from an early age and won the Betty Wilson trophy as the standout player at the Under-18 national titles in 2012, at which she made a remarkable 153 in a 50-over match against Tasmania. Such performances subsequently earned her Australia A selection for their tour of New Zealand. Jemma followed in the family's traditions, made her WNCL debut for Queensland at 15 years of age and was named



Queensland Fire's Youth Player of the Year in 2010-11 and 2011-12. She backed this up with a further tour of New Zealand in which she shared the Player of the Series award for the *Shooting Stars*.

After touring with the Shooting Stars squad, she was chosen in the inaugural Brisbane Heat squad for the 2015-16 WBBL season. As she was preparing for her inaugural WBBL season, she started experiencing shoulder pain and later numbness in her fingers. After testing, she was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis. At this stage her MS symptoms are mild; she is on daily medication, and uses an ice vest on really hot days. Jemma is an ambassador to help raise awareness and funding for the disease and with her Brisbane Heat teammates has participated in many charity events for MS Queensland. After her initial diagnosis she travelled to Dubai with the Australia A Women's team in 2015 to take on England Academy. Off field Jemma is an ambassador for Novartis Australia. She collaborates with Novartis to inspire Australians who live with MS daily via the @managems.com.au campaign.

She moved from Brisbane Heat to join the Perth Scorchers squad for the 2019/20 and 2020/21 seasons. However ahead of the 2021-22 WNCL season, Jemma moved to Adelaide to join the Scorpions squad and the Adelaide Strikers and quickly impressed, captaining the side in the absence of her Australian teammates and has now assumed the role on a permanent basis.

Winning back to back championships with the Strikers she rates as her greatest achievement in cricket.

Jemma thrives on the challenge of cricket. She sees it as such a mental sport and says *I feel like you have more bad days than good but it's those moments that get you back. Love being in the contest and being able to contribute to the team to get the win.*

Her Dad Trevor has been one of the major influences on her game as he was a professional player and later coached at First class level. . He was often able to throw balls or give Jemma advice.

I asked Jemma a couple of very pertinent questions to which she offered profound and thought provoking answers

Who is the best player against whom you have played? Why?

I've been fortunate enough to play alongside and against a lot of very good players. Feel like I can't name just one because you get exposed to so many, playing in the Big Bash. The likes of Meg Lanning (Australian captain), Sophie Devine (NZ and former WT allrounder), Smriti Mandhana (Indian LH batter) and Beth Mooney (Australian batter/wicketkeeper) to name a couple.

Who is the best player to whom you have bowled? Why?

I think the ladies I've mentioned above definitely fall under that category. They're all very good batters and very tough to bowl against because of either their power against spin or how they're always thinking about where you're going to bowl next and how they can get it to that 5th fielder out position.

Although she has only recently crossed to West Torrens and has only played a handful of games due to Scorpions and Strikers commitments, Jemma likes the approach with which the West Torrens Club goes about its cricket and the manner and enthusiasm which 'Froggy' has set up.

Jemma played for Sandgate Redcliffe District Cricket Club in Queensland and had been there since playing with Under 7's, up until she moved down South Australia. Queensland has 8 premier cricket sides which she thinks is too many and could reduce the number to make the competition stronger but she finds the Adelaide and Brisbane comps are fairly similar.

Asked to name three people from the cricket world with whom she would like to have dinner. Her answer was extremely open and confident and perhaps tempting *Anyone that's up for plenty of food and beverages.*

This season the Men's squad has been joined by current Italy international and former New South Wales Junior representative, Harry Manenti. He chose to play for West Torrens when he moved to Adelaide as he knew Spencer Johnson, Dan Drew and Dan Fallins and also Mark Harry was a big contributor in his transit.

Educated at St. Patrick's College, Strathfield in Sydney's inner west about 12 kilometres from the CBD, he took up cricket because older brother Ben (now a Redback contracted player) was playing and his Dad John always encouraged his boys to play sport. John, who is the Australian



Rugby Union 7s Coach has been the biggest influence on Harry's game as he often took the Manenti brothers to the nets when they were young and has been a constant supporter, encourager and reality checker ever since.

Harry has been one of cricket's journeymen having played First Grade in Sydney, Brisbane and Hobart before venturing to Adelaide. However his widest cricketing travel has been to play for Italy where he was chosen to play in

the World Cup preliminaries in Scotland with brother Ben and Spencer Johnson. Spencer withdrew fearing his chances of qualifying for Australia may be prejudiced.

The Manenti boys had Italian passports so the *Federazione Cricket Italiana* CEO contacted them to join the Italian squad a few years ago, but not until 2022 did Harry make his debut. In 2022 they played in Finland and Jersey in T20 international and List A games, as part of the European Regional qualifier for the ICC World Cup. Having won their group, Italy then proceeded to the World Cup qualifiers in Edinburgh in August 2023. Harry loves playing for Italy in every tournament as it is good fun and an experience which very few are afforded.

His greatest achievement in Cricket has been the winning of multiple 1st Grade competitions across different states in all formats, while his biggest thrills have been hitting the winning runs in a match and often the celebration that comes after it.

As a 19 y.o. he clubbed consecutive sixes to steal a win over Adelaide University with two balls to spare in Final of the Fox Cricket National Premier T20 title. This was the culmination of T20 tournaments held in every state and territory involving more than 100 clubs throughout the summer,

He had been a regular Rugby Union player until he left school undoubtedly influenced by his Dad John. Manenti was a prop for Sydney clubs [Western Suburbs](#) and [Sydney University](#) in the 1990s and coached the [Wallerroos](#) at the [2010 Women's Rugby World Cup](#) in [England](#), where team won

the bronze medal. Currently Harry channels his off field time into studying Primary Teaching at Swinburne University (online).

Who is the best player against whom you have played? Why?

Steve Smith, he's bats alright (an understatement doubtless! – Ed.)

Who is the best player to whom you have bowled? Why?

Also Steve smith, made me feel like I was bowling with the wrong arm.

Great club full of generous and supporting people, who just want to see you succeed. I have loved every bit of playing here so far and am very happy with the support I have received since moving.

A new face has taken on the captaincy of the Women's 1st Grade this season. She is Australian representative and widely travelled leg spinner Amand-Jade Wellington. 'Wello' is in her fourth season at West Torrens after transferring from Port Adelaide, when its women's section unfortunately folded, which meant she had to choose another club for which to play. West Torrens really stood out for her with good some mates playing for the *Sheagles*. Now she absolutely loves the culture of the Club and the young talent which is coming through.

She attended Elizabeth Downs Primary School before moving onto The Heights High School but began a fondness for cricket playing in the backyard with her Dad Ken and brothers Zachary and John-Henry, where she taught herself to bowl leg spinners. As these significant males played cricket for the Craigmare & Smithfield Clubs, Amanda-Jade then progressed to hard wicket club cricket with her family's Clubs. Her raw talent indicated that she should venture to a SACA Club and consequently went to the now defunct Tea Tree Gully women's side, where she was spotted and asked to head towards tryouts for SACA junior representative teams. Her Dad has always been a big influence on her game as he would always rock up to matches, cheer from the sideline, sometimes even criticise as well, but it was meant in good spirit.



At the 2011-12 Australian Under 15 Championship 'Wello' was named the player of the tournament. The following season she was selected to play for the Scorpions and became the youngest person, male or female, to represent South Australia in a senior match, breaking the record set by Clem Hill in the 1892-93 season. She was aged 15 years and 150 days; Clem was 16 years and 9 days.

She grasped her opportunities with the Scorpions firmly in the following seasons and in the 2014-15 season she gained the attention of the National Selection Panel and was included in the Shooting Stars side (Australia A) for their tour of [Sri Lanka](#). She was then chosen for the Shooting Stars' squad for their trip to [Dubai](#), where they played matches against the English Academy. In 2016-17 while playing with Port Adelaide she topped the run Aggregate in SACA Grade cricket with 325 runs at 81.25.

As an 18 y.o. Amanda-Jade was called up to become part of the Adelaide Strikers squad for the inaugural WBBL season in 2016. She has flourished in this League being awarded the Player of the Match on four occasions. In

November 2021, she took the best figures in the history of the WBBL, with five for eight from her four overs in The Eliminator match. She also took her 100th WBBL wicket in this game which was also her 100th WBBL match.

She plies her trade across the cricketing world in the Australian winter and has become an international nomad. She was drafted by the Southern Braves for the first season of the *The Hundred* competition in the UK and Northern Districts in New Zealand's *Super Smash* in 2022-23. Last September she helped **Hayley Matthews** guide the Barbados Royals across the line against the Guyana Amazon Warriors to win the Caribbean Premier League title at Brian Lara Stadium in Tarouba, Trinidad. 'Wello's' contribution was 10 n.o. and 4/23.

International career

'Wello's' only Test was against England but she has made 14 ODI appearances as well as 8 T20I games. In December 2017, she was named as one of the players in the ICC Women's T20I Team of the Year. She was a member of Australia's cricket team for 2022 Commonwealth Games. These were the first Commonwealth Games to include Women's cricket and Australia dominated to beat India in the Final to secure the Gold Medal. She was the second West Torrens player to win a Commonwealth Games medal along with Brad Young who competed at the 1998 Games in Malaysia to win a Bronze. Also in 2022 'Wello' was chosen in the Australian team for the Women's World Cup in New Zealand which the Aussies also won.

She regards her greatest achievements as representing Australia in the three formats of cricket and to be a full-time professional. Her biggest thrills from an off-field point of view are travelling the world and playing cricket, the sport she loves. While on field, it is playing in front of big crowds knowing that the people are there watching top class cricket intently.

Other influencers on her game have been **Karen Rolton** and **Shelley Nitschke**. Playing alongside 'Rolts' was incredible and was eye opening for 'Wello'. Also being able to have one on ones with Shelley within the Scorpion structure was pretty important for her as she absolutely loved Shelley's 'no bullshit' attitude.

Amanda-Jade is the elite all-round sportswoman having played at State Junior level in Tennis, Softball, Indoor Cricket and Football and also Indoor Cricket at National level.

In addition 'Wello' is a massive Pokémon collector. Did anyone know that?

Who is the best player against whom you have played? Why?

Hayley Matthews (West Indian and Bajan cricketer) *I've Been lucky enough to play alongside her as well. Sometimes I forget how young she is (age 25), but she has such a bright future ahead of herself. She's an amazing talent and leader!*

Who is the best player to whom you have bowled? Why?

*I personally love bowling to **Susie Bates** (NZ cricketer) it's always a contest between us two. She's always moving around the crease and always making me think, which is quite annoying.*

Any particular thoughts about West Torrens?

Absolute love being at West Torrens, Such a bubbly culture, have been welcomed with open arms and it's been pretty incredible so far!

YOUNG EAGLES ACADEMY- SCHOOL VACATION MATCHES

The School Holidays give our Academy players the opportunity to test their skills against other teams. We've been lucky enough to schedule 7 games through this period, including Night games v East Torrens and a Glenunga Invitational team, plus games against premier clubs Woodville, Prospect & Kensington and the WSJCA Under 12 Rep team. We also had an internal game late in December which was played at Henley Oval thanks to Charlie Nielsen for his additional curating services!

While the results of these games are often secondary to the opportunities for player & team development, we had strong wins against Woodville, WSJCA and close loses to East Torrens & Kensington.

Highlights of the games included:

40 over Internal Game (Henley Oval) – Oscar 40 (60b.), Zane 24 (14b.), Keegan 20 (29b.), Tyler 31 (63b.), Jaxon 23 (31b.), Daniel 2/9 (4ov.), Jack S 2/23 (5ov.). Oscar batted tremendously in this game, while Keegan & Tyler continued to impress.

WSJCA at Henley Oval: Excellent win, restricted WSJCA to 7/113 (30) mainly due to our three spinners Mitch (2/9 off 5), Oscar (1/13 off 5) & Logan (0/17 off 5) and Jaxon (2/14 off 3) and in reply Keegan, batting at #5 posted a gritty 30 off 72 balls to take us from 3/5 to 108 before we finished on 10/122 from our 30 overs. Max A & Jaxon both contributing 12 each. Tyler, who is part of our Academy added 16 (2nd highest score for WSJCA), while two other academy players, Pat 2/8 from 4 overs & Daniel (0/10 off 4) also represented the opponents. Kyle & Lucas had made the WSJCA team but were unavailable for the game.

East Torrens at Campbelltown Oval: East Torrens 9/123 (22ov.) def WT 10/108 (21ov.). Good bowling performance, minimal wides & NBs plus Ben took 3/7 off 4 overs of leg spin. Unfortunately, our fielding wasn't as good with several missed chances, maybe due to the late night!. Kyle (32) & Jayden (30) batted well. It was great to have Jasmine taking part in the game alongside the boys.

Glenunga at Henley Oval: This was a friendly game in which we tried to line up players of similar ability, wicket keeper Jack and Daniel batted up the order and top scored with 13 each as WT posted 2/108 (lots of retirements). In reply Glenunga posted 6/86 with Tom B (2/1) & Tom H (1/3) returning the best figures of the day. Young Angus ("Gus") Jones (son of Scott) scoring 8 (2nd top score) for the away team.

Woodville at St Clair #1: WT 7/202 (30) – All bar two players scored double figures, Max W bludgeoned 28 off 14, Keegan 18 off 19. opening, Mitch 27 from 32 & Paul 20 from 27 shared a 40 run 3rd Wicket partnership. Will's 2/13 off 4 returned the best bowling figures and Max S impressed with his left arm spin (1/11) as Woodville reached 5/91 from their 30 overs.

Prospect at Cane Reserve: Tough game in hot conditions against some more experienced opposition. WT 101 (30 ov.) with our lower order Jaxon 12, Logan 13 and Joey 14 joining Tyler 10, Harry 11 & Mason 12 in making it to double figures. Prospect 4/134 in reply, the boys sticking to task over the last 10 overs taking 2/28 after having them 2/21 off 5. The difference was their more experienced number 3,4 and 5 who made 91 between them & two of those taking 5/18 off 9 overs!

Kensington at Henley High: Great game with WT initially taking 10/112 inside of 27 overs, with Kensi fielding 12 (as is perfectly acceptable in these formats of game where development is paramount). They scooted to 145 off 30 overs. Our fielding was absolutely exceptional, 5 excellent catches without a miss, none better than the one Lucas took at square leg, although Archer's, Daniel's, Patty's and Keegan's (wk) weren't far behind, three brilliant run outs and almost no misfields. Jack S with 3/16 (off 4) had the best figures. A great start (51 unbeaten) with Xavier (23 off 32) & Keegan (24 off 35) opening, then Zane (17) & Ashton (10) had us 1/77 at 15 overs. Unfortunately, a combination of good bowling and loss of wickets plus Keegan's retirement (to give others a hit), meant we ended up at 6/133 from our 30. We did pass the initial 112, five down in the 27th over!

In the three game round robin series against Woodville, Prospect & Kensington, we fielded 32 different players while we are led to believe that the other clubs generally played similar 11/12 player teams with smaller total squads. This is a great testament to the exciting depth of our academy group. In all 47 of our players played at least one game, while our younger players who aren't quite ready to play those games played a game against opposition from some of our community clubs' best Under 10s as a curtain raiser to our internal game. Thank you to all our scorers, umpires & coaches who helped across the academy games.

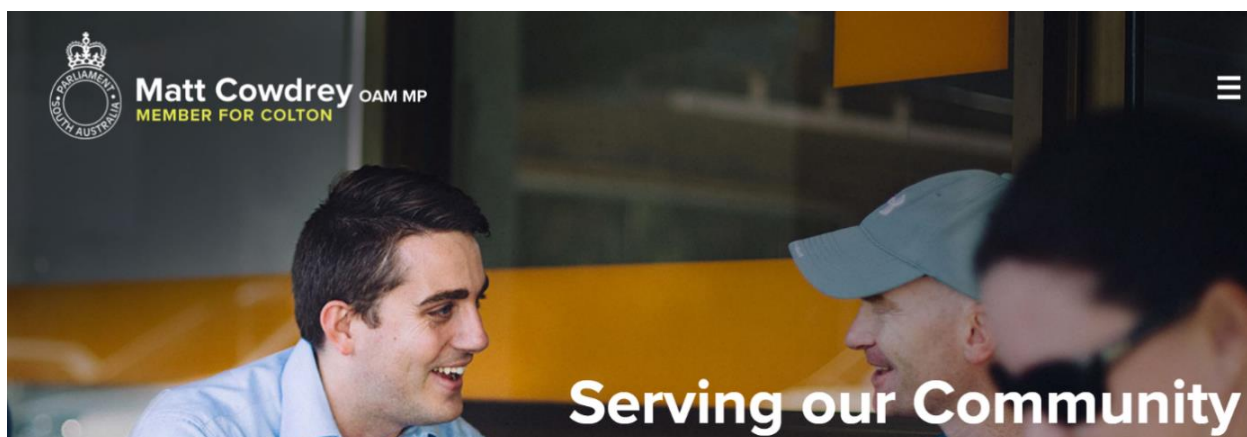
the pressure from the SACA to merge with Port Adelaide is not something I would want to experience again.

- Establishing Women's cricket at West Torrens in 2007-08
- Preventing a compulsory merger with Port Adelaide in 2016-17 through a witless aberration by some SACA bureaucrats.
- Establishing the wide range of top-class cricket facilities at Henley Oval including the Hookey Pavilion, lights, top Grade practice wickets, women's changerooms and Curator's, Storage and Equipment sheds.
- Rescuing two Ugandan international cricketers, Jimmy Okello and Patrick Ochan, from deportation, certain incarceration and possibly death in Uganda
- Producing numerous National and State, male and female cricketers
- Writing two volumes of the Club's history and logging the Club's records from 1857
